# Key words to learn:

Key Command Words	Meaning
Assess	Evaluate or estimate the nature, ability, or quality of something
Discuss	Talk about (something) with another person or group of people or write about (a topic) in detail, taking into account different ideas and opinions
Explain	Make an idea, situation or problem clear (to someone) by describing it in detail revealing relevant data or facts
Consider	Think carefully about (something), typically before making a decision
Identify	Establish or indicate the origin, nature or definitive character of something
Justify	Show or prove to be right or reasonable
Outline	A general plan giving the essential features but not the detail. The main features or general principles of something
Describe	Give an account in words of (someone or something) including all of the relevant characteristics, qualities or events.

Compare	Estimate, measure or note the similarity or dissimilarity between one thing and another(compare something to) draw an analogy between one thing and another for the purpose of explanation or clarification.
Examine	Inspect (someone or something) in detail to determine the nature or condition.
Contrast	The state of being strikingly different from something else, typically something in juxtaposition or close association.
Evaluate	Form an idea of the amount, number, or value of someone or something.
Suggest	Put forward for consideration (a viewpoint) • cause one to think that (something) exists or is the case • state or express indirectly something
Define	State or describe exactly the nature, scope, or meaning of something  • establish the character of something; mark out the boundary or limits of something
