
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Congratulations to the 135 pupils who have completed their Duke of Edinburgh expeditions over the last couple of weeks. We started the season in the South Peak District with the Silver Practise, the views are stunning, but the weather was dismal, the group had to show real resilience having walked in the rain for too long! The qualifier took us to the Shropshire Long Mynd, with breath taking scenery and very stubborn, pilfering wild horses. The teams navigated brilliantly and even managed to fit in a bit of filming. Feedback from our provider praised their brilliant team work, jovial disposition and maturity.

Then followed the Bronze expeditions where 103 enthusiastic pupils were ready to take on the challenge. The pupils started with a sunny training day, all completing this successfully, arriving to camp exhausted, then as usual after a meal and a rest, were all full of beans again! Day 2 is always a challenge as the teams are left to their own devices to navigate to Loggerheads, all teams did well to complete the walk, and appreciated that carrying a 15kg pack is hard that the award is a challenge! The qualifier many started with in trepidation, but all teams navigated brilliantly, enjoying the spectacular scenery around Llangollen, getting to the camp and finish point on time.





Year 12 A-Level Chemistry @ Keele University

On 26th June, the eight Year 12 students currently studying A-Level Chemistry visited the Central Science Laboratories at the University of Keele. They spent the day completing workshops in Keele's modern teaching Chemistry laboratory, involving recrystallisation of paracetamol and analysis of samples by thin layer chromatography, nmr and infra-red spectroscopy. The visit allowed the students to complete one of their Required Practicals for their A-Level studies and gave them a taste of studying the chemical sciences at university.

STEM is such a key area and we need to help inspire these students to pursue careers in these areas."

Almost 50 cars were produced by the year group and STEM Leaders Mrs Almond and Mr Nieroda were thoroughly impressed with the students efforts and innovative designs and ideas.

Congratulations are in order for Design and Technology student Daisy in Year 10 who has been announced as the winner of this year's national WOOL4SCHOOL design competition. The Wool 4 Schools competition takes place each year in Australia, New Zealand, Italy and the United Kingdom.

Students were challenged to design a unique outfit that was inspired by the Elements of the earth including at least 70% of the design being wool.

Her winning design was a dress inspired by Fire as she wanted her design to convey the destructive and cataclysmic nature of fire juxtaposed with the beautiful essence of the natural world. a fabulous garment which uses a range of flame and leaf shapes which uses some recycled materials. It is a runway style piece, to make a statement and increase consumer awareness of the effects of climate change.

The competition was judged by British fashion designer Robyn Lynch. Who was thoroughly impressed, complementing Daisy on her understanding of the client and her design abilities.

As part of the prize, she has won prizes including an all-expenses paid trip to take part in a short course at the University of the Arts London, an XP-Pen Graphic Tablet, and a certificate.

Tarporley students rise to the mathematical challenge

Over the past year almost 500 Tarporley Students have taken part in the UK Maths Trust competitions in various age categories. The students performed amazingly with 89 Bronze awards, 36 Silver awards and 10 Gold awards. Those awarded the Gold certificates were also given the chance to take part in the later stages, the Maths Kangaroo challenges competing against some of the best young mathematicians in the country. Special mention must go to Oscar H now in year 9 who scoring 112 out of a possible 135 received a certificate of merit the highest award available in the Junior Kangaroo.



Huge Congratulations to Cherry who was awarded the 'Secondary Student of the Year' Award at the 2024 Chester Chronical Education Awards. Cherry was nominated by her previous school for her resilience and ability to adapt to change throughout her GCSEs. We are very proud of Cherry and are confident that she will continue to thrive, both in her Sixth Form journey here at Tarporley and also in her future career.



A huge congratulations to Sid in Year II who achieved 2nd place in the Shot put at the English schools competition. She has collected her England kit and is now on the England international athletics squad.

Sid's previous personal best was 12 m 97 cm. She was 10th in the UK. She increased this to an incredible 14.m 73cm and she is now 2nd in the UK. This year at her first county championship, she broke the county record for distance thrown which was set in 1992.







On 3rd and 4th July, eight of our Year 12 students completed a two day TEFL course (Teaching English as a Foreign Language) This qualification will allow the students to travel whilst earning money, teaching English across the world and will most definitely stand out on future UCAS applications and CVs.

Following the completion of the exam component in GCSE & A Level Art, the Art department was bursting with all manner of wonderful creative works. In July we held our annual Art exhibition showcasing the incredible talents of our creative art and photography students. It was a jam packed evening of celebration with students sharing their work with family and friends. A huge thank you to Emily, Dylan, Megan and Nell who gave up their free time to support the curation of the evening.

It's been another busy term in the library! Our Year 7s and Year 8s finished reading Tyger by SF Said during our weekly lunchtime Book Clubs. Winner of the 2023 Children's Book of the Year at the British Book Awards, Tyger also received an award at this year's Cheshire School Book Awards in which a number of our students were in attendance.

The Cheshire Book Awards are held annually at Winsford Academy, with 27 secondary schools in Cheshire taking part in the award this year. Students were encouraged to read as many of the ten shortlisted books as possible this academic year, before voting for their favourite. They were accompanied by English teachers Mrs Toase and Miss Bell, as well as our library team Mrs Parkinson and Mrs Brownrigg. It was another fascinating evening hearing from most of the finalists describe their individual process of writing, with the opportunity for students to purchase some of their books and have them signed. It was wonderful to see our students so inspired by the authors and their works, with many of them asking for autographs and selfies at the end!



On the 1st July, two of our Sixth form students, Issy & Rose travelled to London to attend the Shine School Media Awards (a prestigious awards ceremony held in the beautiful Stationer's Hall) as our Sixth Form publication 'Term' had been nominated. Term Magazine won the Highly Commended award for Best Print & Design and the Highly Commended award for Best Photograph. With over 200 schools entering this competition to be nominated for such awards is something we as a Sixth Form are extremely proud of.

With a General Election looming and students very interested in politics and political issues – as evidenced by our weekly Debate Club run by Tamsin and Will – we attended a Hustings event at Christleton High School. We had the opportunity to ask local candidates from the five main parties questions and students had many queries about important issues such as tuition fees, reduced voting ages, national service, the NHS and more. Following this, we ran a session during PSHE on how elections work; what left and right wing means and each parties' manifesto, before holding a formal Election in College. Students were issued with polling cards, voting slips, replicating the real process. Interestingly, we had a 79% turn-out (much higher than the national average) and Labour were also elected by students – correlating with the national but not the local result.
