The selection was not part of this year's indoor plan for her but when it came, it was an honour and huge privilege, not to mention unbelievable experience. It came after Abi competed in sprint hurdles at the British Championships and British Universities with a time of 8.17 to rank no 1 in the UK in the under 23 age group and 3rd in the UK as an open age senior.

With only one week to prepare, training for a pentathlon was not what it would normally be, but regardless, Abi travelled to Glasgow with Team GB and competed in sprint hurdles, high jump, shot put, long jump and 800m and finished 9th in a World final.


An invaluable experience and motivation to gain further senior international selections.

They displayed exceptional skills and determination, leading their team to an undefeated season. This remarkable achievement made history as it was the first time an RGC team had accomplished such a feat in the tournament.

They demonstrated their prowess by defeating formidable teams like Cardiff Blues, Dragons, Ospreys, and Scarlets. Their contributions played a crucial role in securing victory in all their fixtures. In addition to their success in the regional tournament, both Carys and Chloe are members of the Welch PDC, a platform that recognises girls with exceptional talent. This recognition sets them on a path to potentially represent Wales seniors in the future.

Chloe, in particular, deserves a special mention for her outstanding performance. Despite being only 15 years old, she competes in the under-18 Rugby category, showcasing her exceptional skills and determination. With her remarkable progress, it is hopeful that Chloe will follow in her sister's footsteps and earn an opportunity to represent Wales next year.


